

Apple Trees

Annie Elizabeth English culinary apple raised in 1857. Large fruit used for Victorian dining displays. Stewing apple with light flavour, needing little sugar.

Ashmeads Kernel Pale green aromatic fruit with strong, sweet-sharp intense acid drop flavour. Firm white flesh. Beautiful flowers. (Glos c. 1700)

Court Pendu Plat Possibly originated in Roman times, first recorded in 1613. Fruit has rich, aromatic flavour; mellows to become sweet, scented yet still intensely flavoured in February.

D'Arcy Spice Bright green becoming gold with red flush. Hot, spicy nutmeg flavour. (Essex 18th Century)

Edward VII Green/yellow with russet dots. Pale pink flowers. (Worcester 1906)

Gennet Moyle Much grown in Hereford in C19th. Cooks to bright lemon puree; sharp strong flavour needing little sugar.

Herefordshire Russet
An exceptional new variety with robust flavour.

Jumbo Large dual purpose apple, golden-cream flesh. Stores until March. New variety.

Jupiter Large apples, sweet, juicy and aromatic.

Kidds Orange Red Yellow with red stripes. Sweet, crisp and aromatic. (New Zealand)

Meridian Striped orange-red on pale green background. Juicy with aromatic flavour.

Newton Wonder Very large, very colourful, late culinary apple. Cooks to cream, juicy puree. Later in season makes brisk, fruity eating apple; good for savoury salads.

Pitmaston Pineapple Flavour of pineapple, blended with honey and musk. (Hereford 1785) *(all sponsored)*

Princesse Heavy cropping russet. Less nutty flavour than Egremont. (France)

Red Devil Scarlet flushed fruit with superb strawberry flavour and pink juice.

Red Windsor Superb flavour and heavy crops. A red sport of Alkmene.

Ribston Pippin Sweet aromatic crisp fruit with yellow-red flush. Firm deep cream flesh. (Little Ribston, near Knaresborough, North Yorkshire 18th Century)

Scrumptious A wonderful complexity of flavours, fragrant and honeyed, soft and delicate, crisp and sweet.

Spartan Dark red sweet fruit with some acidity, juicy, crisp white flesh. (Canada 1926)

Tydemans Late Orange Orange/red colour with some russet. Firm and sweet. Rich and aromatic before Christmas.

William Crump Green/yellow with red stripes and orange/red flush. Rich, intense and aromatic (Worcester 1910)

Winston Green/yellow with a purplish red flush and attractive lenticels as russet dots. Flavour like Cox but sharper. (Berkshire early 20th Century)



Greengage Trees

Dennistons Superb (Imperial Gage) Transparent sweet flesh with red flushed skin. (USA 19th Century)

Early Transparent The small golden melting flesh is very sweet. (Hertfordshire 19th Century)

Old Greengage Derived from the middle ages, an excellent old fashioned flavour. (UK)

Oullins Golden Large golden yellow fruit of delicious gage-like flavour. (France 1860)

Plum Trees

Mirabelles (or cherry plums) are generally a culinary fruit for bottling, compotes or jams. They are large (up to 35 grams) have the sweetness and tangy flavour of some of the best plums and can be eaten fresh as well.

Mirabelle Golden Sphere Large, almost translucent fruit, firm and crunchy with a fresh 'plummy' flavour.

Mirabelle Gypsy Large dark carmine with an orangey flesh. The flavour is sugary and rich.

Pear Trees

Onward Light green fruit changes to yellow-green, some have a pinkish flush and others a heavy russet. Creamy white flesh has a sweet rich and juicy flavour.

Winter Nelis Pale green turning to yellowish green, almost covered by russet. The greenish white flesh is juicy and sweet. (Belgium 19th Century)

Quince Trees *(all sponsored)*

Meeches Prolific Early, large, pear-shaped, yellow when ripe. (USA 1880)

Vranja Large, pale green/yellow. Good flavour. (Serbia 1800)
